
Peter Christian Johnson received his Bachelor of Science (Environmental Science) at Wheaton College (Wheaton, IL) and his Master of Fine Arts at Pennsylvania State University (University Park, PA).

Johnson has taught at Eastern Oregon University (La Grande, OR) and Pennsylvania State University (State College, PA). He has been a resident artist and visiting lecturer at the Australian National University

(Canberra, Australia), the Archie Bray Foundation for the Ceramic Arts (Helena, MT), the LH Project (Joseph, OR) and the Odyssey Center for Ceramic Arts (Asheville, NC). Johnson has exhibited in Australia, Canada and throughout the United States, including the exhibition *Fluid* with Bobby Silverman at Eutectic Gallery (Portland, OR) in 2015 and the solo exhibition *POISE* at Ferrin Contemporary (North Adams, MA) in 2016.

Architecture, labour and time aesthetically inform Johnson's porcelain sculptures. Reminiscent of architectural plans for Gothic churches, the laboriously exacting porcelain structures are transformed/warped during the firing process as a soft, fluid skin of glaze envelops the structure. The pairing of soft and hard in the form of glaze and grid conceptually materializes deconstruction.

Johnson is presently an Assistant Professor at Kent State University (Kent, OH).
